### To be effective, councils have to be a safe place for everyone to share and contribute. Here are some common safety killers:



#### **Holding too tightly**

Your ideas are vital, but they are a piece of the puzzle, not the whole thing. Share what you have, but don't hold too tightly to it.



#### Interrupting

Cutting someone off with a "yabut" or a "well actually" is rude, and makes people feel unsafe to share their ideas.

Wait and listen.



#### **Going on Mute**

Everyone's thoughts and ideas are needed. Don't hold back. Silencing yourself makes it harder to receive revelation, not easier.



#### **Dismissing Ideas**

Every piece of the puzzle is vital, even those that you disagree with. Many puzzles are never completed because pieces are missing.

# As we counsel together, <u>how we share is as vital as what we share</u>. Validating others' ideas and elaborating on them will create an environment where the Spirit can guide us and help us see where we need to be.



## **Validate**

To validate is to offer support or encouragement. When we validate each other, we make it safe to share and create an environment for the Holy Ghost to guide our discussion.

- I like that you are focused on...
- That's a valid point
- ▶ I agree
- ▶ Yeah
- **▶** Hmmm



## Elaborate

Whether we agree them or not, elaborating on others' comments instead of correcting or dismissing them makes it safe to share and sheds more light on the subject.

- To add on that...
- I have a different perspective on this
- In my experience...
- l'd like to piggy back off that
- Can I come at this from a different angle?
